

We are grateful for any sightings you submit, and require that you include the following key bits of information with your sighting.

- Who you are You don't need to be a wildlife expert to help us collect data, but having a record of who made the sightings helps validate them, as well as increasing how useful they are and how long they last. If a second person can confirm the sighting this is helpful, particularly for rare, unusual, and difficult to identify species.
- What you saw Even if it's a common species, we're keen to hear about it, as common wildlife often goes under reported. If you're not certain about what you saw, please don't record it. Scientific names (e.g. *Erithacus rubecula* for Robin) are helpful if you know them.
- Where you saw it the more accurate you can be the better. Information such as the name of the reserve, park or green area, or the town or post code are all very helpful. A grid reference would be ideal.
- When you saw it This helps us look at how wildlife communities change over time, as well as verify records (for example a hoverfly in December is likely to be a mistake). Please use the DD/MM/YYYY format
